It's Action Magazine's 50th Birthday. For 50 years, you've been reading about the impact your prayers and support have had in the lives of people affected by leprosy.

When I was told of this milestone, I had a look at the precursor to Action Magazine. It was called Without the Camp and it was crammed with stories of the leprosy-affected people helped since the early 1900s. Take this story from 1910 in India.

"A young wife is stricken with leprosy, and forthwith her husband turns her out onto the street. She finds her way to the asylum, and some months afterwards gives birth to a little baby girl. 'I named her Pyari, which means love.'"

This young mum was forced to give up her child, who was then sent to a "Home for Untainted Children".

How far we've come since then! A century ago, there was no cure for leprosy but today Multi Drug Therapy has changed the face of leprosy treatment. Had this young mother been able to receive MDT, she could

have raised her own baby. Instead, she was reduced to begging to see little Pyari from afar.

Today this kind of suffering is unnecessary. Yet suffering, pain, poverty, stigma and even death from leprosy still occurs. Just read what happened to Emiliana (centrespread) and Alfredu (page 10)!

The good news is your generosity means people affected by leprosy are being diagnosed, treated and forging new lives. Thanks to you, children with leprosy are being cured and go back to school with dreams of getting jobs and helping their families.

Because of you, people are treated and join self-help groups where they learn how to prevent disabilities. They receive training and go on to start small businesses. Some of them, like Joel (page 6), even join The Leprosy Mission to fight for the rights of people affected by leprosy.


I thank God for people like you who have been so faithful in supporting this ministry. But I don't want us to be complacent. Leprosy is still a very real problem today.

Once trapped inside her home... but now she's living her dream and winning awards!



Award winner... thanks to you



Once she thought she'd never achieve her dream of running her own shop. Now she sells cosmetics and lovely children's clothes and toys. And knitted hats, socks and jumpers made with her own hands.

This is incredible given that Parbati also lost many of her fingers to leprosy. But she learned how to knit and sew — thanks to you.

Once Parbati was dependent on her brother and only able to crawl around their home. Now she is the one supporting her elderly father — thanks to you!

She smiles as the people in her village buy from her. They're amazed to see how she's overcome leprosy and disability. She no longer faces stigma from her community. Instead there is respect... thanks to you.

Parbati has exciting plans to grow her business and stock more products. This will give her a greater income and means she can contribute more to her community.

Parbati can't stop smiling — and it's thanks to you.

This is a far cry from her life several years ago. You may remember her story.

Leprosy began to destroy her feet and hands at age 13. Eventually they became ulcerated and seriously infected from cuts and injuries while working in the fields. That's how she lost her fingers and the fronts of her feet.

Parbati felt so isolated... and left with no hope.

That is, until she went to The Leprosy Mission Anandaban Hospital in Kathmandu. After eight months of ulcer treatment, some corrective surgery and then rehabilitation, she was fitted with prosthetic boots. What a joy it was to take those first steps!

While in hospital, the other women there taught her how to read, write, knit and sew. Her lack of fingers hasn't held her back!

The 8 months of rehabilitation gave Parbati the life skills she needed to return to her village — to WALK into her village — and create a new life.

She's so thankful to all the people — including you — who have played a part in her recovery from leprosy and making her dreams come true.

"It would not be possible to stand on my own without support of people in my life," says Parbati.



"I want to see people with disabilities access everything — education and their rights!"

Joel's experience was like so many with leprosy - one of loss.

In 2005, he found leprosy patches on his face. He lost movement and sensation in his hand as it began to claw. His friends abandoned him and even his family wanted to have nothing to do with him.

But thanks to supporters like you, his life turned around. Through The Leprosy Mission, Joel received the treatment he needed. He also found new friends and he found a new mission in life!

Multi Drug Therapy cured his leprosy. Surgery and physiotherapy means he now has better movement in his hand.

And although he had to drop out of college, The Leprosy Mission field workers encouraged him to work instead to help others with leprosy and disabilities in Timor Leste.

This has become Joel's new vision. Now working as the head of your Rights for People with Disabilities project, he works to show people how to care for leprosy-affected limbs and prevent permanent disabilities.

He is also passionate about helping people affected by leprosy and disability to access their rights. This includes the right to be accepted and included within their communities and not be shunned or ostracised. To be given the treatment they need and not be hidden away. To be educated and follow their dreams. To earn an income and be selfsustaining. To live with dignity.

"In Timor Leste, people believe that those with disabilities cannot do anything. I explain to families and local leaders that in the future people with leprosy and disabilities can be included in the community.

Today, Joel is married. His family has accepted him again as they better understand the disease of leprosy.

What a joy to see Joel restored in his body, restored to his family and now working to stop others suffering as he did!

YOU CAN HELP FIGHT POVERTY AND MISUNDERSTANDING ABOUT LEPROSY

"My father left my mother before I was born. My mother works six days a week as a seamstress but still earns very little money. When I first noticed I had white patches on my skin, I thought it was fungus... My mother cared so much about me. When she saw how sick I was she spent all her money trying different treatments. But nothing helped."



YOU CAN HELP STOP NEEDLESS PAIN

"One day my mother found a local healer who told us that he could help. He wrapped my arms and legs in banana leaves and put my arms and legs over a fire. It was so hot and painful. I could feel it in my bones... My skin became black... I thought I was going to die."

YOU CAN HELP STOP THE STIGMA OF LEPROSY

"My friends told me I was cursed and received this disease because my father left us before I was born. I started to believe them. No one wanted to be friends with me. They would run away from me because they thought they would catch leprosy from me."

YOU CAN HELP A CHILD AFFECTED BY LEPROSY TO FINISH SCHOOL

"My hand was clawed and it was hard to write. I had to take my friend's notes home to copy them because I was so much slower than everyone else. I love it when the teacher gives us homework because I have lots of time to work on it... Even though I experience pain, I want to go to school and learn."





YOU CAN HELP CURE, CARE FOR AND RESTORE A CHILD WITH LEPROSY

"When the Leprosy Mission staff found me, my arm was fixed in one position. They told me about a clinic where I could get medications which treat leprosy. They massaged my hand and showed me exercises which would help the movement of my limbs. They prayed for me and treated me like a human being."

YOU CAN GIVE A GIRL LIKE EMILIANA THE CHANCE TO ACHIEVE HER DREAMS

"My arm now has greater motion and I can write faster now at school. If I study hard I might be able to go to university, get a good job and help my mum. With an education I can have a bright future. One day I want to become a midwife so that I too can help others."



After 15 years of living in a shack with pigs and rats, it was too little, too late for Alfredu

This is why your support is so important

It was a government health worker in Timor Leste who found Alfredu.

Because something smelled bad. Very bad. And it was coming from a shack behind the house the health worker was visiting.

Here Alfredu was found lying naked. He had a fever and had not eaten for four days. He had terrible, infected wounds on his feet

It was in 2002 when the ulcers started appearing. His family thought Alfredu was cursed so they hid him in the shack.

So for 15 years, Alfredu shared this shelter with pigs. Rats would come and eat his toes but he could not feel it because he had lost all sensation in his feet.

Too frightened to come near him, his family would leave a plate of food on a bench in the shack. That was the only human contact he had during those long years.

When Castro, a Leprosy Mission worker, first saw Alfredu he was shocked and horrified at his condition. He helped to clean and dress Alfredu's wounds. He was the first person to touch this neglected man since he was banished from the family home.

As Alfredu's condition worsened and he stopped talking, Castro arranged to have him transferred to hospital. But although he received treatment, it was too little, too late. Alfredu passed away on May 9, 2017, just four days after being found. He was believed to be in his fifties when he died.

Although it was too late for Alfredu, it doesn't have to be too late for others. Castro will now arrange leprosy screening for Alfredu's family and neighbours. He will also organise leprosy training for other community health workers in the district.

This is why your prayers and support of The Leprosy Mission are so important. To stop others affected by leprosy from suffering the same fate as Alfredu.

This man should have received proper treatment for leprosy and lived a full life — like Emiliana, Joel and Parbati in the earlier pages of this magazine.

But at least Alfredu was found in time to spend his last days with dignity and was properly cared for in hospital. Instead of dying alone and neglected in a shack with pigs and rats.

TAKE ACTION

Let's stop others with leprosy from dying as Alfredu did. Because leprosy IS treatable and curable! Early diagnosis and treatment is vital. To donate, please fill out the back page of this magazine and send it back to us.

MEET NELSON, ONE OF YOUR FIELD WORKERS IN TIMOR LESTE



Nelson is Timor Leste's Community Based Rehabilitation Project Coordinator. His own experience with disability has inspired him in his work with The Leprosy Mission. He wears orthotics due to polio which left his legs damaged when he was three.

"My condition drives me to help others. In some leprosy self-help groups, the people say 'we cannot do anything'. They feel useless. But when I show them my leg they are surprised. They think I just use a cane, but I have metal on my leg. It helps them know they CAN work."

This was the Scripture reading for the day Christine passed away. It's from the daily devotional book she and her husband shared. It's a beautiful expression of the love she had for her Saviour.



Do you recall Suwaiba from Nigeria? Thanks to your generous support to last year's May Appeal — she received her medicine.

Her symptoms developed over a period of 15 years. But she is thankful she has not experienced any stigma.

Without proper treatment her symptoms got worse. The ulcer on her foot became infected. But once diagnosed with leprosy she received proper Multi Drug Therapy (MDT) treatment.

Suwaiba received training in self-care and the ulcer has healed well. She finishes her treatment soon, thanks to you!

Pius from The Leprosy Mission Nigeria read to her your messages. Many of these messages include bible passages, and being from a Muslim community these are new to her. So Pius had the opportunity to share the Good News of Jesus and the Gospel with her in her local language.
